President's Message

Twenty years ago if I told someone that I was a forensic scientist the usual response was "Are you like Quincy?" I would politely reply, "No, I'm more like his lab assistant, Sam". Today, as a result of many high-profile celebrity homicide cases and TV shows, there is a growing fascination with our field by the media and the public. This attention can be distracting to us as we work in our laboratories and testify in courtrooms.

All of this attention has had both positive and negative implications for our field. One of the results has been the so called "CSI Effect". This has raised the expectations of our profession, mostly by juries, but in some cases by lawyers and law enforcement officers. For example, when I testify that I could not obtain a DNA result from a sample, I often wonder if the jury is questioning my capabilities as a forensic scientist. That scenario would never happen to the forensic scientist on "CSI".

As for the expectations by law enforcement personnel, sometimes it seems that they are misinformed as to our limitations to analyze different types of evidence. It is our responsibility to make sure they understand our current level of technology. This can be accomplished through training courses, with lab personnel instructing crime scene examiners, case detectives, prosecutors and defense attorneys. This will insure that they are informed about any new methods that are being used in the lab, the best methods for the collection and packaging of evidence, and ways to prevent contamination. The courses will also promote interaction between the lab personnel and investigators and establish a line of communication which is essential in most cases.

One of the benefits of all this attention has been that most laboratories have been able to expand from tiny operations with only a few scientists and microscopes, to new facilities with larger staffs and state of the art equipment. The national, state and local governments have provided funding to make this possible. Hopefully these funds will continue to flow as time goes on so we can keep up the level of technology and staffing.

This "CSI Effect" can often make our jobs more complicated and we can easily get distracted by it, but we have to stay focused. We should use the resources that we have to do our work to the best of our abilities. Regional organizations, like NEAFS, can help forensic scientists stay up to date with current topics and the latest advances in technology. Take advantage of this opportunity by attending this year's meeting which will be held October 31- November 3rd at The Sagamore Resort. This newsletter contains many details about the annual meeting including the preliminary schedule, registration forms, and workshop descriptions. Please take a few minutes to look at all the information provided.

In February, the Pennsylvania Joint State Government Commission appointed Michael F. Rieders, Ph.D., as a member of the Commission's Advisory Committee on Wrong Convictions. Dr. Rieders is a Forensic Scientist and Licensed Laboratory Director at NMS Labs, Willow Grove, PA were he is also Chairman of the Board of Directors.

The Wrongful Convictions Committee was established to study the underlying causes of wrongful convictions and to make findings and recommendations to reduce the possibility that innocent persons will be wrongfully convicted in the future.

Nationally, more than 180 individuals have been exonerated through post-conviction DNA testing, and some of those individuals spent time on death row. At least eight individuals have been exonerated in Pennsylvania through post-conviction DNA testing, three of whom were in prison for murder and one of whom was on death row. Not only is it a great injustice to imprison an innocent person, but by incarcerating them, there is the likelihood that a guilty person remains capable of committing additional crimes.

The Committee will consider potential implementation plans, cost implications and the impact on the criminal justice system for each potential solution. The Committee will report their findings and recommendations to the Senate by November 30, 2008.



Proposed Murder Mystery Social Event October 31, 2007 Halloween Night



Trace evidence analysis can be a very challenging endeavor and its correct interpretation can be extremely helpful in both the investigative and adjudicative stages of a case. Pharmaceuticals are the street drugs of the future. Illicit drug dealers can generate substantial profits and encounter far less penalties and jail time from dealing pharmaceuticals like Viagra, Vicodin, Oxycontin and Xanax, than from selling illicit drugs such as cocaine, heroin ,marijuana or even Ecstasy. The internet has provided a "grocery store" to aid in the delivery and abuse of these substances. Pure economics dictates that the same pill presses used to manufacture illicit MDMA tablets can and are being used to "knock-off" legitimate pharmaceuticals. These counterfeits represent a threat to the health and safety of all Americans and a threat to the pharmaceutical industry itself. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA), pharmaceutical companies and law enforcement agencies are aggressively dealing with this problem. The workshop will focus on the scope of the problem from an investigative, intelligence and scientific perspective. An intelligence overview of the problem of counterfeit trafficking will be provided along with investigative techniques utilized in the successful prosecution of illegal counterfeit trafficking. The scientific tools and processes utilized by both forensic and pharmaceutical scientists in detecting drug counterfeits will be discussed. Case studies of counterfeits will be provided from an investigative, forensic and pharma perspective. As forensic DNA scientists try to get information from difficult samples that are degraded or diminished in amount, they are faced with results that are often challenging to interpret. Mixtures and partial profiles are becoming more common as investigators increasingly request analysis of evidence from burglaries or touch evidence. Examples will be worked illustrating the statistical approaches used following mixture deconvolution. The status of software solutions for mixture interpretation will be examined. The workshop will also include a discussion of the advantages and limitations of miniSTR assays in terms of recovering information from old or degraded DNA samples. The recently released MiniFiler kit will be discussed as will new miniSTR autosomal loci under development at NIST. Finally, cautions and careful approaches to using high-sensitive techniques such as low-copy number DNA testing will be reviewed.


